> "I'll Fly Away" has been called the most recorded gospel song, and it is frequently used in worship services. It appears in many hymnals where it is lised under the topics of eternal life, heaven and acceptance. It is a standard song at bluegrass jam sessions and is often performed at funerals. It was sung by Gillian Welch in the popular film "Oh Brother Where Art Thou."
